#### **English**

English this week is focused around two books, **Little Evie in the Wild Wood** and **Little Red**. The website is interactive, using flash cards and images to click on and videos to watch and listen to. Over the course of the week, there are opportunities to look at the settings, characters and focus on the language used. These tasks are both focusing upon reading skills and writing skills. You will then be 'innovating' your own story, using similarities from both books. Here is the link to access the full weeks learning: Writing sequence link

We would love to hear your story. After you have written or story mapped your own story, you could read it or retell it to us. Ask an adult or sibling to film you telling your story and send it over to use on your Year 3 email address above, we would love to see what you come up with!

Monday	Vocabulary focus: Using new vocabulary from the story. Pause at each interval to reflect on the
	word meaning and the context it is used in the sentence.
	TASK Use each word in the given sentences <u>then</u> use the words in sentences of your own.
Tuesday	Similes: Use similies within a descriptive sentence to describe the wolf. Remember to describe
	how it looks, how it moves and its attitude or behaviour. Use the flash cards to select appropriate
	similes for the wolf or write some of your own.
Wednesday	Story mapping: Using only 5 images, story map the story of Little Red being read using the video
	to help you. (link to Little Red here) Remember: only include key events to summarise the story.
	Then, reflect on both stories, which did you prefer? See the sentences to help you explain your
	ideas.
Thursday	Comparison: Using the flashcard questions, reflect on both stories, comparing the characters,
	settings and events.
	Using a table with 3 columns, compare the stories. List all the features from Little Evie in the first
	column, and all the features of Little Red in the third column. In the middle column, list all the
	features that are the same in both stories For example, both stories feature a woodland setting.
	(see Venn diagram on website for more examples)
Friday	Innovation: Using the middle column from Thursdays task, it is now your turn to write a story. You
	can change the details and tell your own story using new and exciting events. However, all the
	features, which are listed in the middle column, must stay the same.
	See examples under Friday – Writing task

 Spelling: WORD FAMILIES: Choose an activity from the Spelling Menu each day; complete this in addition to the English tasks.

#### **TT ROCKSTARS**

10 games on garage.

You could use the 'Rockslam' section for a change. This means you can 'challenge' another player from Year 3. Go to the 'ROCKSLAM' tab, choose a player to challenge by clicking on their name. Then click 'start challenge match'. You don't need to be online at the same time as the person you are challenging. They will be able to

see that they have been challenged when they next log in. There will be a red circle with a number in to show how many 'Rockslams' you have been challenged to. You could even challenge one of the **Year 3** teachers! (Please don't challenge any other teachers)

#### **❖** NUMBOTS

Although Numbots starts very easy, over time it really will improve your child's mental arithmetic ability. We'd like them to play on it for 5 or 10 minutes a day, by doing this you will also see they become quicker at completing calculations for the 4 formal methods. You can access it through TT Rockstars, click 'story,' see how many coins you can earn so you can buy new parts for your robot, you could send us a picture of your robot so we can see what it looks like. We can see from our Stats some children are making super progress – so well done to you! An information sheet was pinged to you with the last set of work to give you more understanding of the program.

- Practises handwriting weekly they could write out their spellings or a favourite poem or song
